

DESIGN FOR A BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,129, dated March 7, 1876; application filed February 23, 1876.

[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ALEXANDER JAMES DALLAS, major Twenty-third Infantry, of Omaha Barracks, in the county of Douglas and State of Nebraska, have originated a Design for Badges and other similar articles of manufacture; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

The nature of my design will be fully understood by reference to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, in which—

A represents a clasp or bar having a border, a, inclosing the words "National Association Veteraus;" B, a ribbon or connecting piece, provided with vertical stripes b b^1 b^2 , the stripe b being blue, the stripe b^1 white, and the stripe b^2 red, by preference. The arrangement of the colors of the stripes is not, however, an essential element of this design. C represents a shield, the outer edge of which is provided with a border, c, having the names of battles of the Mexican warthereon. At one corner of the shield C is a vessel, and at the opposite corner a cannon, while in the upper end of the shield is a bursting shell, beneath which is arranged a group of arms. About the center of the shield are arranged the word

"Mexico," a maguey plant surrounded by cactus, a castle, and the figures "1846," surrounded by a wreath, banded together below by a series of folds bearing the names of officers. Surrounding the wreath are arranged a series of stars.

The parts A and C may be formed of metal, and the connecting-piece B of silk or othe: fabric, or the whole design may be executed on metal, fabric, or other material.

What I claim as my invention is-

1. The design for a badge or similar article, composed of the shield C, having upon its face the representations of a ship, shell, group of arms, cannon, plants, castle, wreath, stars, and inclosing border c, substantially as described and shown.

2. The design for a badge or similar article, composed of the clasp or bar A, connecting-piece B, and shield C, having upon its face the emblematical representations, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.
