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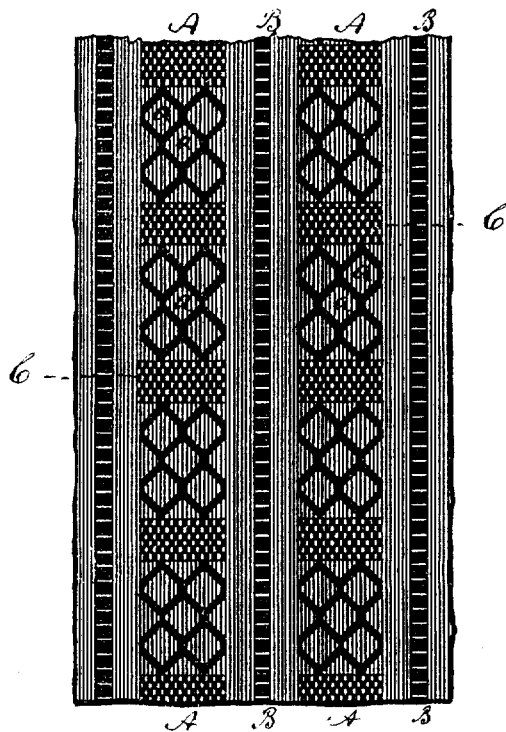

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,153**, dated March 21, 1876; application filed September 25, 1875.

[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM A. WALTON, of Providence, in the county of Providence and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawings making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The distinctive peculiarity of my design for fancy woven cassimeres consists in the novel composition of a complex longitudinal stripe, which in itself constitutes the main feature of my design, and which, combined with an intermediate complex stripe, constitutes a second feature thereof.

Referring to the drawings, A denotes the novel complex stripe. It is composed of lateral bars C, woven in small squares, contrasting with the main ground of the fabric. These lateral bars are located at regular short intervals longitudinally in the fabric. Between these bars are five four-sided united figures set diagonally in the fabric, as at *a*, on a plain

woven ground. These complex stripes are bounded on each side by plain weaving, and their individual effect is maintained, whether they be placed closely side by side or are separated by the wide stripe of plain weaving, which is divided longitudinally by the block-stripe at B. My design may be worked up in colors, or the lines and effects may be produced solely by fancy weaving with yarn of a single color.

I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

1. The design for fancy cassimeres, embodied in the complex stripe A, composed of the lateral bars and the united four-sided figures, substantially as shown and described.

2. The design for fancy cassimeres, embracing the complex stripe A and the intermediate longitudinal block-stripe B, substantially as shown and described.
