DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,164, dated March 28, 1876; application filed March 16, 1876.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern, (TT;) and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface of the board the stitches which are to be taken in producing the pattern; and the design consists in the peculiar form and configuration of the letters of the motto, as shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

The motto which constitutes the base of this design is, "After Clouds, Sunshine." These words are arranged on the surface of the board, as shown, with a foliated tracery surrounding and intertwining with the words. The chief character of this design is the capitals, irrespective of the particular arrangement of the words.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the motto "After Clouds, Sunshine," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
