

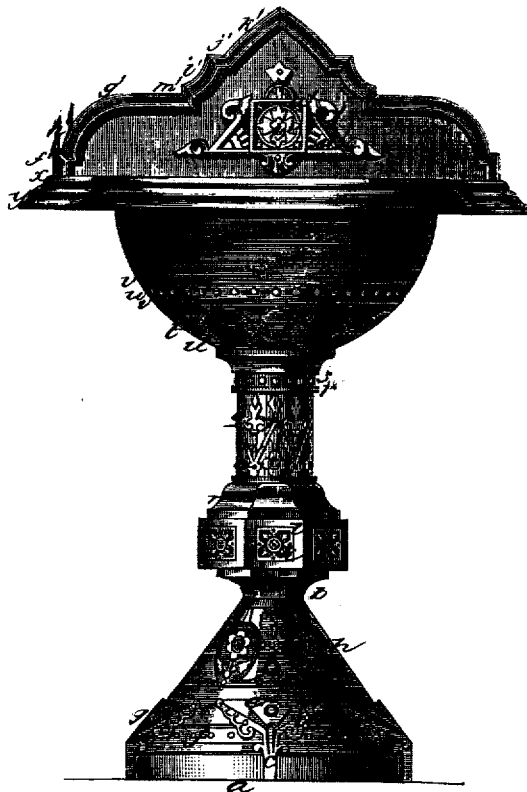

DESIGN FOR WASH-BASINS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,174**, dated March 28, 1876; application filed March 21, 1876.
[Term of Patent 14 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM TWEEDDALE, of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for Wash Basins, of which the following is a specification:

My design is fully represented in the accompanying engraving, to which reference is made.

The base commences with the plain section *a*, from which, to point *b*, it is cone-shaped, and the lower portion of the surface is ornamented with the upright branching figures *c* *d*, which are surmounted by the figures *e*, also with the beads *f* and flutes *g*. The upper portion is figured with the ornaments *h*, *i*, and *j*. The lower portion of the column, which is considerably enlarged, has the star-shaped panels *k* and plain borders *l*, and connects with the cylindrical upper portion by the ogee section *m*. The body of the column is figured with the triangles *n*, figures *o*, points *p*, darts *q*, plain ring *r*, and the beads *s*. The base of the basin is figured with the upright and branching ornaments *t* *u*, lines *v*, and the beads *w*. The edge of the top plate is wrought in ogee form, *y*, with a bend, *x*, above. The back plate has the shield *a'*, with a star, *b'*, in the center, surrounded by a ring, the shield being surmounted by the figure *c'*, and supported on the sides by the bracket-shaped figures *d'*, with horns *e'*. The top of the back is trimmed with a bead-molding, having the upright sections *f'*, horizontals *h'*, convex sections *g'*, uprights *m'*, concaves *i'*, horizontals *j'*, and the convex sections *k'*.

I claim, as a design for the base of a wash-basin—

1. The design for the base of a wash-basin, consisting of the upright and branching ornaments *c* *d*, top figures *e*, beads *f*, and the grooves *g* of the lower portion of the section, as set forth.

2. The ornaments *h* *i* *j* of the upper section of the conical base, as set forth.

3. As a design for the column of a wash-basin, the plain-bordered star panels *k* *l*, as set forth.

4. The ornamental figures *n*, *o*, *p*, *q*, *r*, and *s* of the cylindrical portion of the column, as set forth.

5. As a design for the bottom of a wash-basin, the ornamental figures *t*, *u*, *v*, and *w*, as set forth.

6. As a design for the top of a wash-basin, the ogee form *y*, surmounted by the bead *x*, as set forth.

7. As a design for the back of a wash-stand, the shield *a'*, with the central star *b'*, the top figure *c'*, and the side figures *d'* and *e'*, as set forth.

8. The design for the top of the back plate of a wash-stand, consisting of the bead-molding, arranged in the sections *f'*, *g'*, *h'*, *m'*, *i'*, *j'*, and *k'*, as set forth.
