DESIGN FOR FABRICS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,181, dated April 4, 1876; application filed March 20, 1876. [Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EDWIN R. WARRING-TON, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have produced or invented a Design for a Fabric, of which the following is a specification:

My design for a fabric is fully shown in the

accompanying drawing.

The central feature of the design is a medallion containing a bust of Lafayette, and having at each side groups of leaves b, and beneath it sprays d, with blossoms. Below this is an eagle, which carries in its beak the stem from which the sprays d project, the eagle standing upon a group of leaves and flowers, on either side of which are leaves and branches e.

This pattern is repeated over the whole of the fabric.

Irrespective of the colors employed, I claim-

The design for a fabric, substantially as described, and as illustrated in and by the accompanying drawing.
