DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,190**, dated April 4, 1876; application filed March 27, 1876.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern, (U U;) and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface the stitches to be taken in embroidering; and the invention consists in the representation of the head of Washington, combined with the words "The Father of his Country."

The principal capitals are surrounded with a tracery branching over the words as an ornamentation. The principal characteristic of the design is the head combined with the words specified.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the representation of the head of Washington and the words "The Father of his Country," as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
