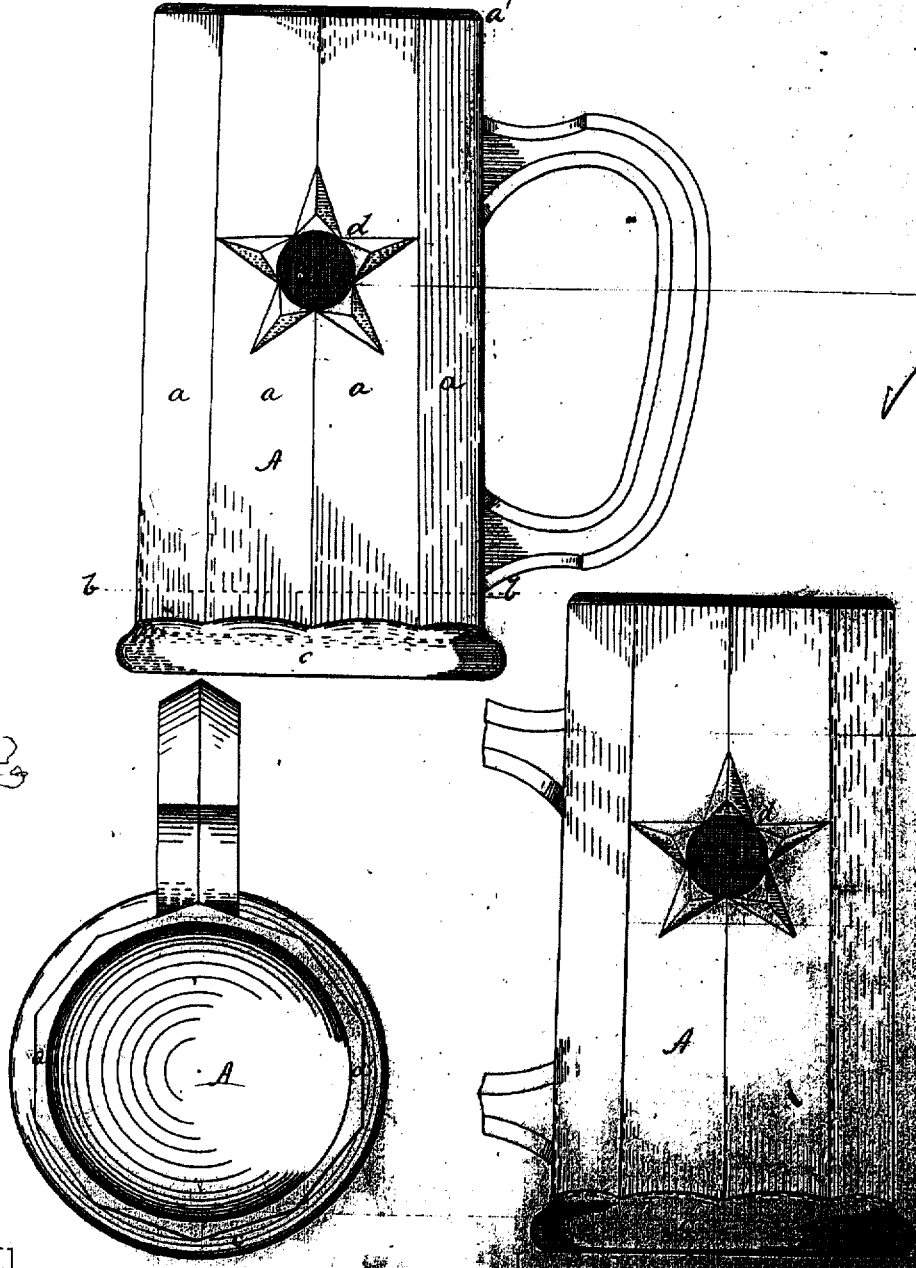

## DESIGN FOR BEER-MUG.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,211, dated April 11, 1876; application filed April 3, 1876.  
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that we, JOHN OESTERLING, of Wheeling, in the county of Ohio and State of West Virginia, and JULIUS PALME, of New York, in the county of New York and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Design for Beer-Mugs or Ale-Glasses, with or without foot or stem; and we do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing forming part of this specification, and illustrating our design as applied to a beer-mug.

Our design is intended for beer-mugs or ale-glasses, with or without foot or stems, and consists in forming the exterior of an ale or beer-glass of a series of planes upon one or more of which star-shaped figures are formed.

We will now describe the design, with reference to the drawing, so that others skilled in the art to which it appertains may reproduce the same, or one bearing close resemblance thereto.

A represents a beer-glass, the outer surface thereof bounded by a series of planes, *a a*, which extend from the lip *a'* to a point below the cavity of the glass, as indicated by dot-

ted line *b*, but terminating sufficiently above the base to leave a continuous base-ring, *c*. This form alone will give a peculiarly marked effect, but in addition thereto we form upon one or more of the plane exterior surfaces the stars *d*, and upon one of said emblems we generally make the figures 1776, and upon another the figures 1876.

Having thus described our invention, what we claim as a design for ale or beer mugs is—

The form or configuration produced by making the exterior surface of the glass to consist of a series of planes, upon one or more of which star-shaped figures are formed.
