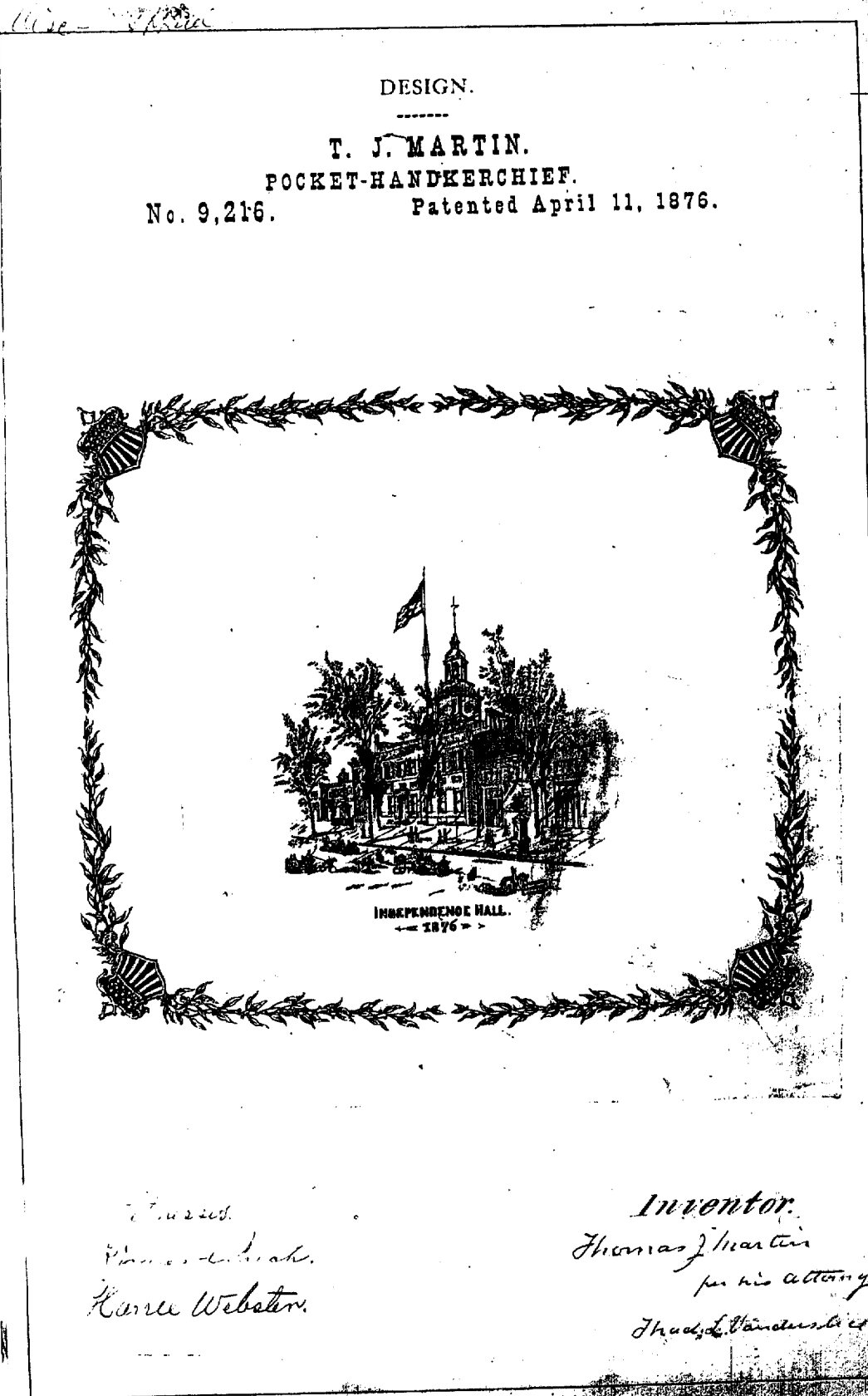

THOMAS J. MARTIN, OF PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA.

DESIGN FOR POCKET-HANDKERCHIEFS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,216**, dated April 11, 1876; application filed April 5, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, THOMAS J. MARTIN, of the city and county of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated a Design for Pocket-Handkerchiefs; of which the following is a clear and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photograph, which said photograph fully designates a pocket-handkerchief ornamented according to my design, which design consists of an elevation of Independence Hall, on Chestnut street, between Fifth and Sixth streets, in the city of Philadelphia, printed or otherwise produced on a pocket-handkerchief, with the words "Independence Hall" and the numerals "1876" under or in front of the building, all of which is surrounded by a border around the edges of the handkerchief, as shown in the photograph.

The building, words, numerals, or border

may be variously colored; but I do not consider the colors as an essential part of my design.

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The design for a pocket-handkerchief, composed of the representation of Independence Hall, in the city of Philadelphia, as seen from Chestnut street, the words "Independence Hall," and the numerals "1876," all surrounded by an ornamental border, as herein shown and described.
