

DESIGN FOR AN ORGAN-CASE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,217, dated April 11, 1876; application filed March 2, 1876.

[Term of Patent 14 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, AARON S. NICHOLS, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Organ-Case; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a perspective view.

This invention relates to a design for organcases; and consists in the peculiar configura-

tion, as hereinafter described.

The angles of the lower section A are furnished with a buttress of polygonal form. On each of the angles is a projecting rib, starting from the base B and terminating at the crown-molding H, the upper ends of the ribs being of bracket or supporting form. The ends of the lower section are also furnished with similar ribs C between the panels. The upper section D is furnished with columns E at the angles, and at each side the book-rack supporting the

crowning cornice. These columns are ornamented at the base and capital by ailantus leaves F, and at the center by an annular series of buttons, G.

I claim-

1. The design for an organ-case consisting of the polygonal buttresses at the outer angles of the lower section A, with ribs projecting from the angles of the buttresses, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

2. The design for an organ-case consisting of the ribs C on the ends between the panels, from the base B to the crown-molding H, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

3. The design for an organ-case consisting of the upper section D, ornamented at the angles by columns E supporting the crowning cornice, and ornamented as shown in the accompanying illustration.
