JOHN C. W. WRIGHT, OF PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA.

DESIGN FOR A BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,239, dated April 25, 1876; application filed March 7, 1876 [Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John C. W. WRIGHT, of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed an Ornament or Badge, to be worn upon the person during the Centennial Exhibition, or during this Centennial year, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is clearly shown in the accompanying illustration, to which

reference is made.

A represents the main portion of the badge, which may be made or composed of silk, woolen, or any woven fabric. Upon the face of the badge are two portraits, B C-B being the portrait of George Washington, general of army of the United States in the year 1776. C is the portrait of U.S. Grant, President of

the United States during the present or Centennial year, 1876.

Across the badge, immediately above the portrait of Washington are printed the figures "1776." In the center, or between the two portraits, is the word "Centennial," and underneath the portrait of Grant are the figures "1876," immediately under which is the word "Philadelphia."

The design for a badge, composed of the portraits of Washington and Grant, arranged one above the other, in connection with the inscription, and dates, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying draw-
