

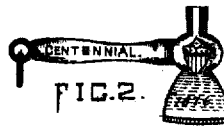

DESIGN FOR A WATCH-CHAIN CHARM.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,247, dated April 25, 1876; application filed March 1, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM WALLACE SCOTT, of the city of Pittsburg, in the county of Allegheny and State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Centennial Watch-Chain or other Charm in the form of a hatchet, with suitable inscriptions thereon, of which the following is a clear, full, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration or drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

Figure 1 represents a side view of my Centennial charm, having a profile of Washington and the inscription "G. Washington," "Truth," and the figures "1776." Fig. 2 represents the reverse side of my charm, upon which is an American shield, the word "Cen-

tennial," and figures "1876;" but on either side thereof other suitable inscriptions may be used. At the end of the handle of the hatchet there is a ring.

The design of my charm is to represent the famous hatchet of George Washington, having suitable inscriptions, to be used as a watch-chain charm or badge.

I claim—

A design for a watch-chain charm of the configuration of a hatchet, and having on one side the portrait of George Washington, and on the reverse side the representation of a shield, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.
