## DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,265**, dated May 2, 1876; application filed April 26, 1876.  
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, **EMIL CRISAND**, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for pattern for embroidering, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface of the board the pattern to be wrought. It consists in a representation of flowering lilies with the motto "Consider the Lilies."

The principal feature in the design is a bouquet, or several branches representing lilies, and on the face of the pattern the words "Consider the Lilies." These words may be arranged as shown, or otherwise, it only being essential to the design that these words, or words of the same meaning, be present.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern consisting of the representation of the lilies, and the words "Consider the Lilies," as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
