

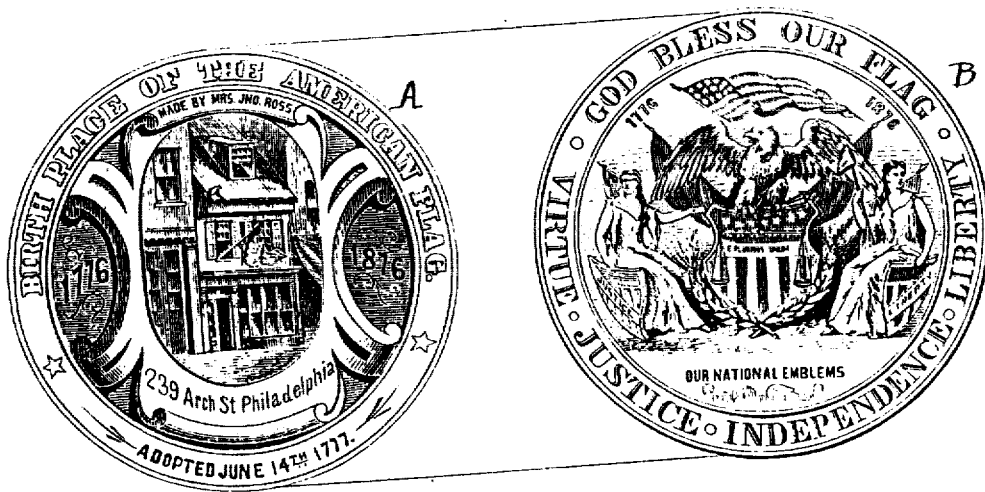

DESIGN FOR A BASS-RELIEF.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,312**, dated May 30, 1876; application filed May 15, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ERASTUS O. FRINK, of Indianapolis, Marion county, Indiana, have originated a Design for a Bass-Relief, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description:

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying drawing.

A and B are medallions raised or embossed on any suitable object. In the center of the medallion A is the representation of a two story and attic tenement, *a*, with which may be combined the figures "1776," "1876," and the words "Birth-place of the American Flag," "239 Arch st., Philadelphia," "made by Mrs. Jno. Ross," "Adopted June 14th, 1777." The medallion B contains the representation of a shield supported on opposite sides by two sitting female figures, and surmounted by an eagle. With these may be combined flags, at the rear of the shield, a flag carried by the eagle, the figures "1776," "1876," the words "God bless our flag," "Virtue, Justice, Inde-

pendence, Liberty," "Our national emblems."

The figures, letters, and devices of both medallions are in bass-relief.

I claim—

1. The design for a bass-relief, consisting of the representation of the house in which the first United States flag was made, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.

2. The design for a bass-relief, consisting of the representations of a tenement, a shield, the female figures at opposite sides of the shield, and an eagle surmounting the shield, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.
