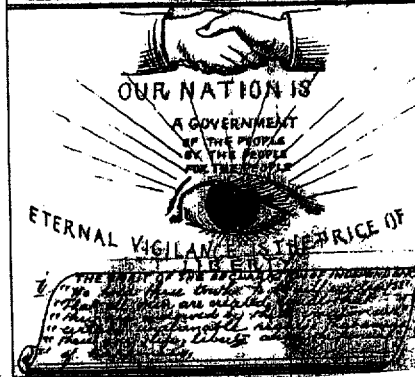
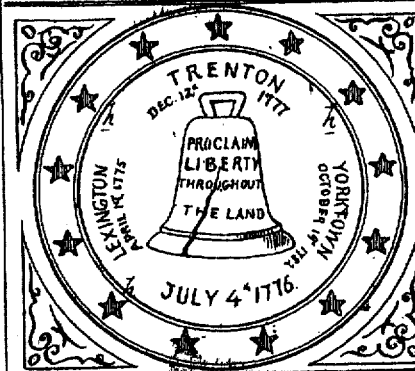
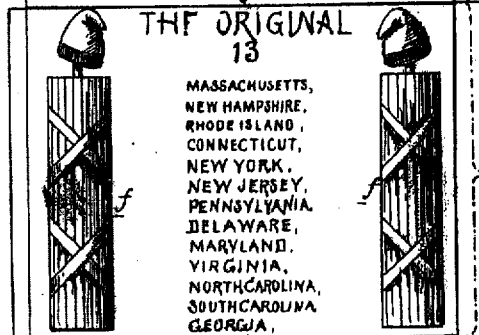
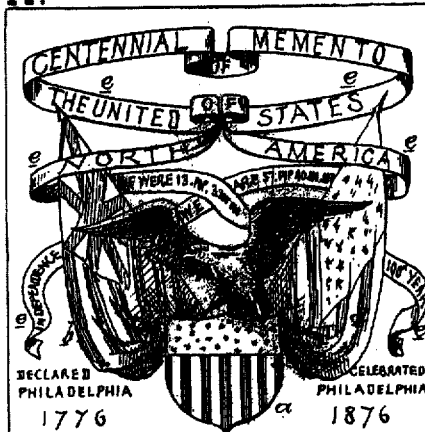

DESIGN FOR A BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,341**, dated June 13, 1876; application filed March 10, 1876.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WALTER HART, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have invented a Design for a Badge, of which the following is a specification:

My design for a badge is fully shown in the accompanying drawing.

The design comprises a central shield, *a*, surmounted by an eagle with outspread wings; a continental flag, *b*, being draped on one side of the shield, and an American flag, *d*, on the other. Above and entwined with the flags is a scroll or ribbon, *e*, with the following inscription: "Centennial Memento of the United States of North America. We were 13, Population 3,000,000. We are 37, Population 40,000,000." On one end of the scroll is the word "Independence," and on the opposite end the words "100th Year." Beneath the word "Independence" are the words "Declared Phila-

delphia, 1776," and beneath the words "100th Year" the words "Celebrated, Philadelphia, 1876."

I claim—

1. The design for a portion of a badge comprising a shield, *a*, surmounted by an eagle, the draped Continental flag *b*, and draped American flag *d*, as shown and described.

2. The design for a badge comprising the shield *a*, the eagle, the draped flags *b* and *d*, the scroll *e*, and inscription, substantially as described, and as shown in and by the accompanying drawing.
