DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,403**, dated July 18, 1876; application filed July 3, 1876.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface the pattern to be wrought.

The design consists of the motto and emblem, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

The motto is in two parts, the first consisting of the words "Malice toward None," and the second "Charity for All." The emblem

represents the head of the late President Lincoln.

The peculiarity of the design consists in those words and their combination with this emblem as an embroidery-pattern. An ornamental tracery is interwoven with the words, and all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The herein-described design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the motto in two parts, "Malice toward None" and "Charity for All," combined with the representation of the head of President Lincoln as the emblem, in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
