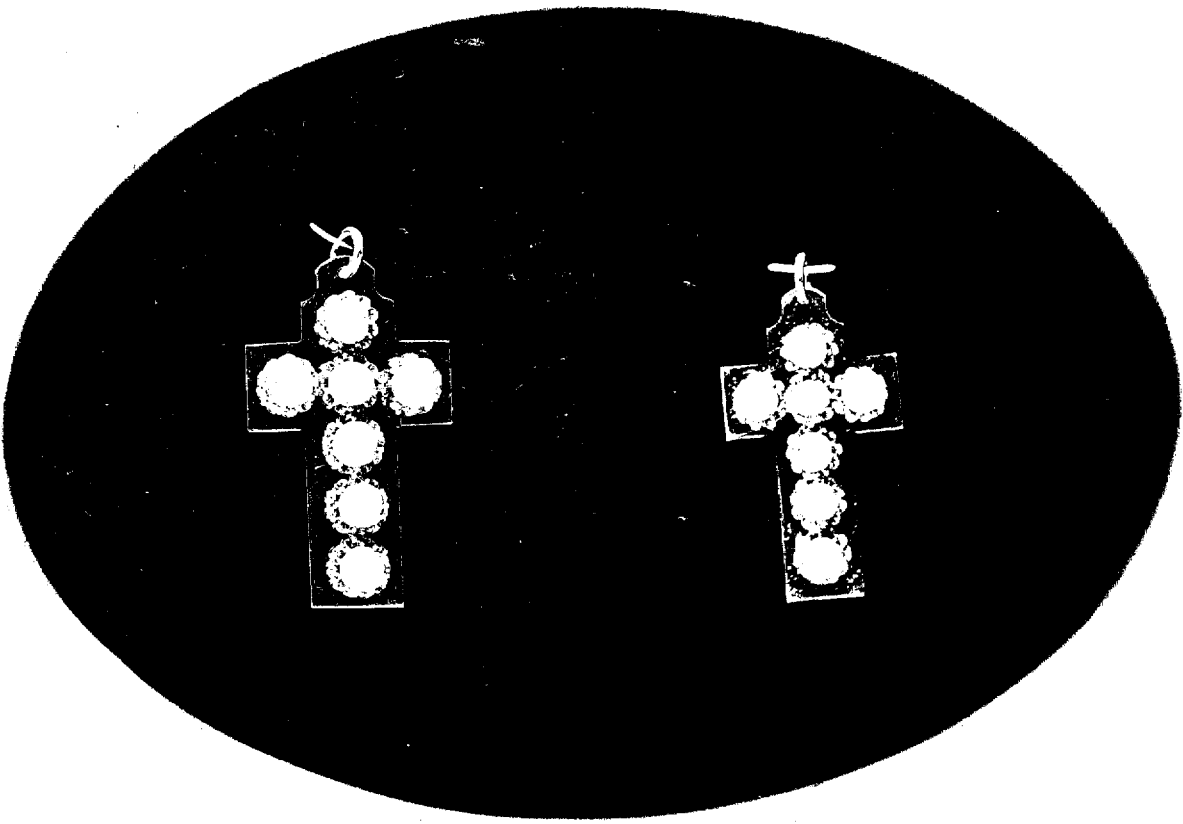

## DESIGN FOR A CROSS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,413**, dated August 1, 1876; application filed May 11, 1876.  
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, WILLIAM B. MENAGE, of the city and county of Providence, in the State of Rhode Island, have invented a Design for Jewelry, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully shown in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made. It consists of setting jewels or stones in the form of a cross, and superimposing the same upon the highly-polished surface of a metallic cross, which forms the back or body of the article of jewelry. This polished surface reflects the setting and the stone, and thus produces a rich and brilliant effect. Diamonds, amethysts, pearls, brilliants, corals, and other stones may be thus set. The settings are united together in

a cruciform. The metallic cross is made wider than the settings, and the cross of jewels is put upon the top or polished surface of the metal, being fastened thereto by soldering to it or otherwise the four end settings.

I am aware that it is not new to adorn metallic crosses by setting jewels therein; but hitherto the stones have been set into the cross.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for a cross, consisting of the cross of set jewels upon a polished metallic cross, substantially as described and shown.
