DESIGN FOR A CHARM, MEDAL, OR BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,418, dated August 1, 1876; application filed June 26, 1876.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, EDWARD H. HART, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and JAMES C. ANDERSON, of the city of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, have invented a Design for a Campaign Badge or Charm, of which the following is a description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of our design is fully represented in the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

A B, Figure 1, represent two coin-shaped disks or plates joined together by a ring, having on their obverse sides or faces, respectively, a representation of the Old Liberty Bell, with the inscription "Proclaim liberty throughout the land," and the numerals "1776," and the likeness of Rutherford B. Hayes, nominated for the Presidency of the United States, while on the reverse sides or faces of said disks are

seen, respectively, a representation of the American shield, with the word "Centennial" and numerals "1876," and the likeness of Wm. A. Wheeler, nominated for Vice-President of the United States.

Having described our invention, what we claim is—

The design for a charm, medal, or badge, composed of the disks A B, joined together, and having the ornamental devices and portraits on their respective faces, as described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.
