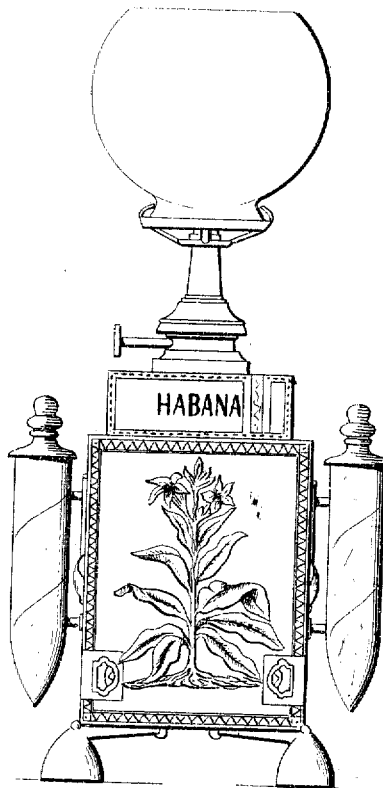
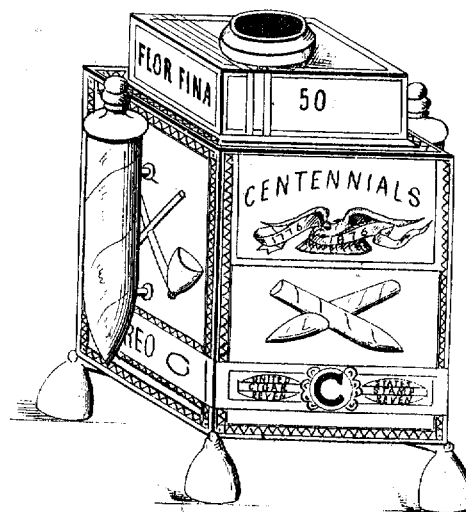

DESIGN FOR CIGAR-LIGHT.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,421**, dated August 1, 1876; application filed July 24, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE A. WOODS, of Meriden, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Cigar-Light; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent in—

Figure 1, a front view, and in Fig. 2 a perspective view, showing the reverse side.

This invention relates to a design for what is known as cigar-lights—that is to say, a lamp or burner combined with founts and dips as a convenient means for lighting cigars; and the invention consists in the configuration and ornamentation, as hereafter described, and recited in the claims.

The body represents a cigar-box as the base, and a smaller box as the crown. The base is supported on a representation of smoking-pipes, and is ornamented on one side with a representation of a tobacco-plant, on the reverse with crossed cigars, and on the other two sides with crossed pipes. At each side there is a fount for alcohol, representing a cigar, tipped with the handle of the dip, and upon the top of the whole the burner is arranged.

Part of this design may be applied to other

parts not here represented, as, for instance, the body may be different, but supported on the pipes, or the body the same and otherwise supported, and so on with the various parts.

I therefore do not confine myself to the combination of all the parts; but

I claim—

1. The design for cigar-light herein described, consisting of a body supported on a representation of pipes, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

2. The design for cigar-light, consisting of the representation of cigar-boxes, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

3. The design for cigar-light herein described, consisting of the ornamentation of the body by the representation of a tobacco-plant, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

4. The design for cigar-light herein described, consisting of the ornamentation of the body by crossed pipes and cigars, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

5. The design for cigar-light, consisting of a body with an alcohol fount on opposite sides representing a cigar, as shown in the accompanying illustration.
