DESIGN FOR A SHAWL OR LACE PIN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,449, dated August 22, 1876; application filed August 10, 1876.

[Term of Patent 34 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LEONARD S. BEALS, of Astoria, in the county of Queens and State of New York, have originated and designed a Design for a Shawl or Lace Pin, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying drawing, which represents a face view thereof.

My design consists in an oblong escutcheon which is ornamented with variously-shaped ribs or beads, as will be hereinafter fully specified.

In the drawing, the letter A designates an oblong escutcheon containing ribs or beads $a \ b \ b \ c \ c$, arranged according to my invention. The rib a forms the central figure of the group, and has the shape of an indented square. From two opposite sides of this central rib a, and in the direction of the length of the escutcheon A, extend the ribs $b \ b$. These ribs taper outwardly for part of their length from the central rib a, and are arranged in a zigzag course, forming an oblong inclosed figure. At the outer ends of the ribs $b \ b$ are situated

the ribs c c, which are diamond-shaped, as shown.

By these characteristic features I obtain a design presenting a handsome and distinguishing appearance.

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

1. The design for a shawl or lace pin, consisting of the ribs or beads a, b, b, and c, c, sub-

stantially as shown and described.

2. The design for a shawl or lace pin, consisting of the indented square a, formed by

raised ribs, as shown and described.

3. The design for a shawl or lace pin, consisting of the oblong tapering figure b, formed of raised ribs, as shown and described.

4. The design for a shawl and lace pin, consisting of the indented square a and oblong tapering figures b, formed of raised ribs, as shown and described.
