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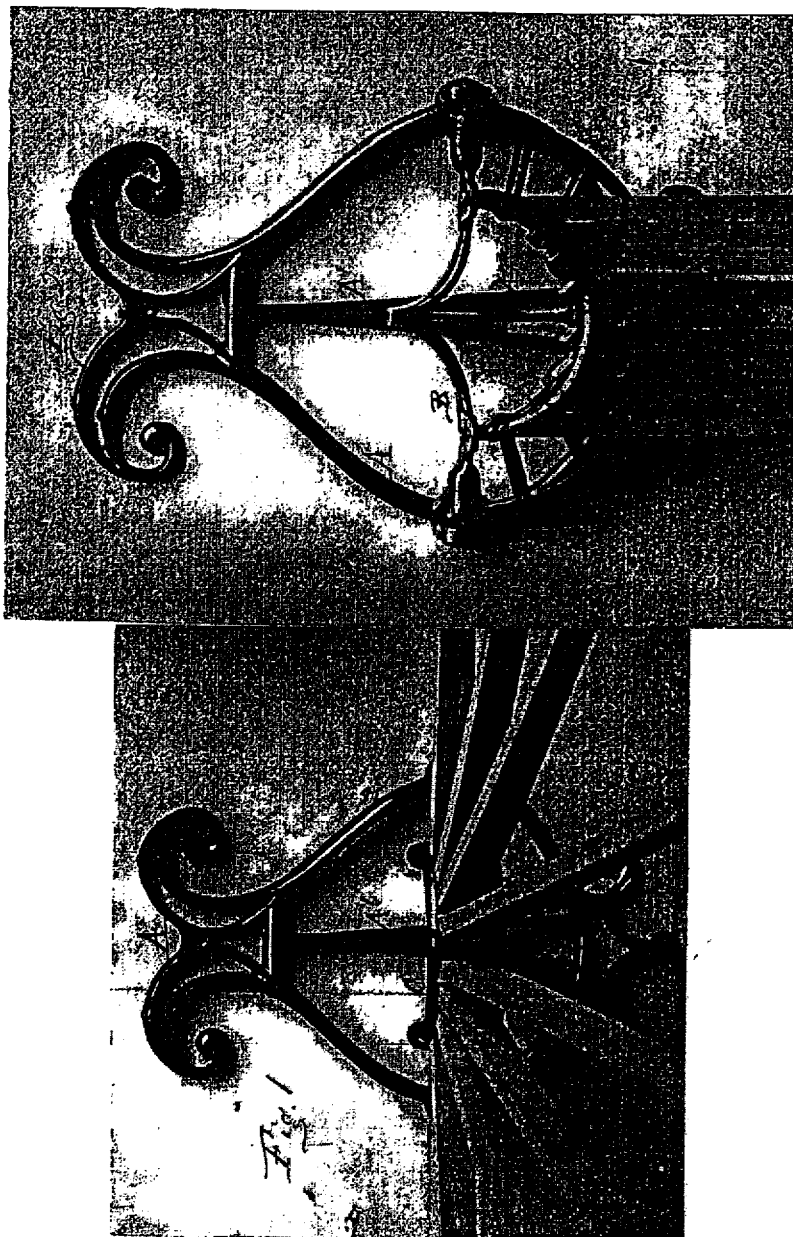

DESIGN FOR CLOTHES-DRIERS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,501**, dated September 26, 1876; application filed August 31, 1876.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY P. ROBERTS, of Tunkhannock, in the county of Wyoming and State of Pennsylvania, have originated a Design for a Clothes-Driers, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 shows the drier with the arms extended, and Fig. 2 with the arms closed.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

A represents the body of the bracket, lyre-shaped, with curved double scrolls at the top, uniting at their extremities, and with a three-pointed scroll at the bottom. In the middle

is a vertical bar, A', slotted at the lower half, as shown. B is a curved rock-shaft, journaled in brackets at each side of the main frame, and carries a semicircular frame, C, in which the wooden arms D are pivoted.

When the arms are to be extended they are raised to a horizontal position, as seen in Fig. 1, carrying with them the frame C and rock-shaft B, and sustained in that position by means not necessary here to describe.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for the lyre-shaped bracket A A', rock-shaft B, and bar-frame C of a clothes-drier, substantially as shown and set forth.
