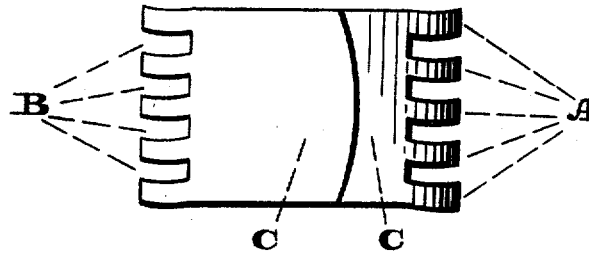

DESIGN FOR BRACELETS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,590, dated October 17, 1876; application filed September 14, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY CARLISLE, Jr., of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a new and useful Improvement in Bracelets, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the drawings hereto annexed.

Figure 1 is a face view of the bracelet. Fig. 2 is a view of the same spread to show the entire configuration.

A represents a series of longitudinally extending parallel strips, separated from each other by intervening spaces B, and united to end pieces C, both sides of each strip being undulate, thus forming a band, which, when

bent so as to encircle the wrist, and in use or wear, presents the appearance of several bracelets of undulate or wavy form, light and graceful.

The band may be made of hard rubber, horn, metal, or other suitable material.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for a bracelet consisting of a series of separated strips with undulate sides, and connected to end pieces, substantially as above described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
