DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,596**, dated October 24, 1876; application filed October 12, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for an embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface of the board the portion to be embroidered to produce the desired effect.

The pattern embraces, as the principal feature, the motto "Kind words can never die;"

and it consists in this motto printed upon the surface of the board, as shown in the accompanying illustration and hereinafter described. These words are arranged upon the board as shown in the accompanying illustration, the principal feature being the peculiar form of the letters composing the words. The pattern is ornamented by tracery, as shown.

I claim—

The herein-described design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the motto "Kind words can never die," as shown in the accompanying illustration.
