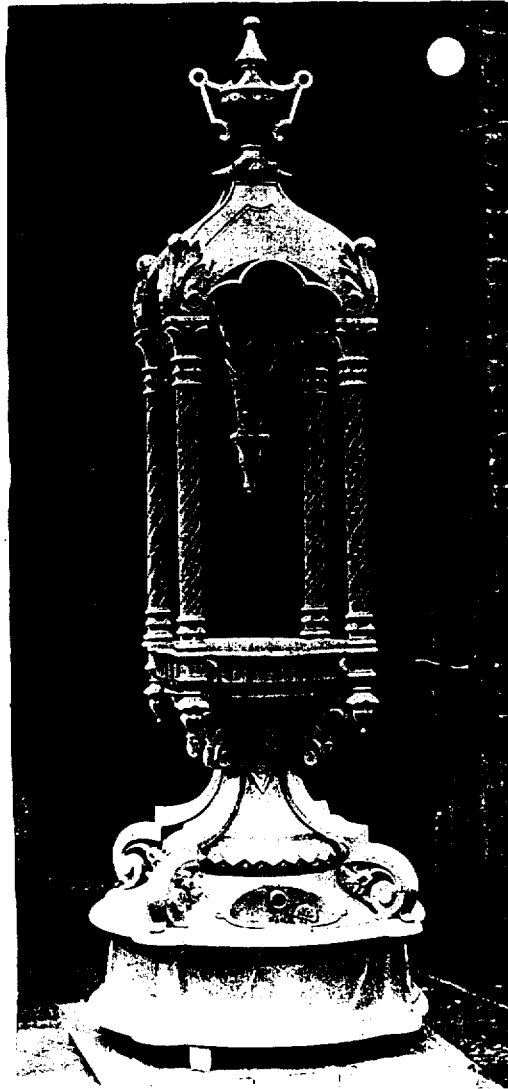

DESIGN FOR DRINKING-FOUNTAIN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,617, dated November 14, 1876; application filed October 26, 1876.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSEPH W. FISKE, of New York, in the county of New York, and State of New York, have invented certain Improvements in Design for Drinking-Fountain, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully illustrated in the accompanying photograph, to which reference is made.

The design is for a new style of drinking-fountain for persons and dogs; and it consists of a base, which is rectangular in its general form, but is made ornamental by having its sides swelled or curved outward at their center, with a rounded projection at each corner, and having its top inclined or sloping from the base of the vase or bowl toward the edges on all sides. In this inclined top, at one side, is formed a small oval recess or cup, to hold water for dogs to drink from. Upon this base is mounted an ornamental vase or bowl, supported by four ornamental scroll-brackets extending from the corners of the base up alongside of the vase, and from the upper termination of these brackets there project four vertical columns, united at their upper ends to an arched roof or canopy, this roof or canopy being of a modified Gothic style, and surmounted by a small urn, with a large or-

namental pendant depending from its center over the vase or bowl. Each of the vertical columns is provided at its upper end with a capital, and above that is a leaf, while at the point where the columns are united to the vase or bowl they are provided with an ornamental base, terminating below at the sides of the vase or bowl in points somewhat resembling acorns, the whole thus forming a most beautiful and symmetrical design for a drinking-fountain.

It is obvious that the merely ornamental parts, such as the brackets, the bases and capitals of the columns, the central pendant, and the terminal urn at the top may be varied without materially altering the general design, which consists essentially of the base, the vase or bowl, with the columns supporting the roof or dome.

What I claim as my invention is—

The herein-described design for a drinking-fountain, consisting of a vase or bowl supported on a base, with a dome or canopy supported over the same by vertical columns, substantially as shown.
