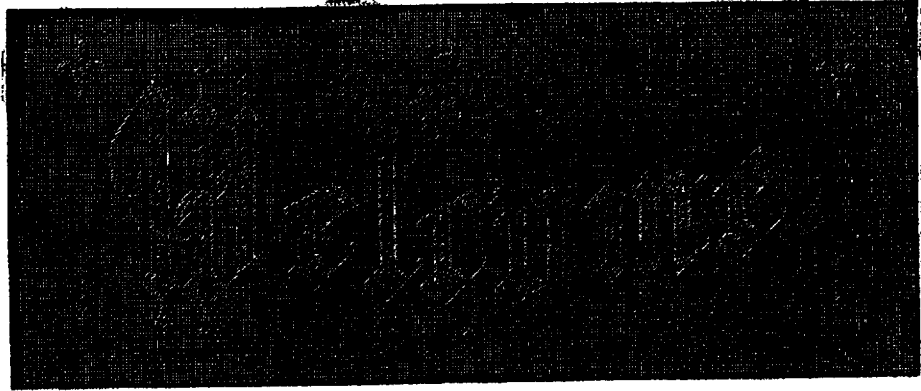

DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,657**, dated November 28, 1876; application filed November 6, 1876.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven, and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated card-board, the object being to indicate on the surface of the board the pattern to be wrought. It consists in the configuration and ornamentation, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

The principal feature in the pattern is the word "Welcome." The letters composing this word are arranged upon the representation of a banner, surmounted by a branch of flowers, all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The herein-described design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the word "Welcome" on the representation of a banner, surmounted by a branch of flowers, as shown in the accompanying illustration.
