

## DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,754, dated February 20, 1877; application filed February 2, 1877.

[Term of Patent 3; years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface of the board, and relatively to the perforations, the surface to be embroidered, to produce the desired effect; and the invention consists in the pattern as shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

The principal feature of this design is the motto "I am the vine, ye are the branches," the words arranged as shown in the accompanying illustration, and combined therewith is a vine, represented as springing from the earth below, the branches intertwining with the words, all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim-

The design for embroidery-pattern consisting of the motto "I am the vine, ye are the branches," with a vine interwoven with the words, as described and shown in the accompanying illustration.
