DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,755, dated February 20, 1877; application filed February 2, 1877.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery - Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface of the board, and relatively to the perforations, the surface to be embroidered to produce the desired effect; and the invention consists in the pattern, as shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

The principal feature of this design is the motto "The Lord is my Shepherd." These words are arranged as shown in the accompanying illustration, the shepherd's crook introduced as an emblem. A flowering vine forms an ornamentation or bed for the letters, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim-

The design for embroidery pattern, consisting of the motto "The Lord is my Shepherd," and the flowering vine, as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
