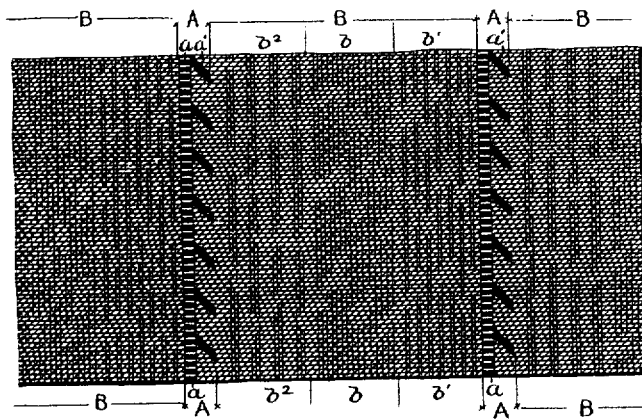

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,900**, dated April 10, 1877; application filed March 26, 1877.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM B. WEEDEN, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawing making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The effect of my novel design will be apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made, said effect being produced by the combination and alternation of peculiarly woven and shaded longitudinal stripes, as hereinafter described.

The narrow stripe A is composed of a longitudinal line of corded weaving, *a*, from which project, in a diagonal direction, short bars *a'*, forming a stripe of peculiar character. These longitudinal stripes A divide the plainly-woven surface of the fabric into broad stripes B, which are shaded through their central portions *b* by fine broken longitudinal lines a slight distance apart, the outer portion *b'* of

said stripe being more openly shaded by slightly heavier broken longitudinal lines, while the other outer portion *b''* is still more openly shaded by still heavier broken longitudinal lines, giving to the general surface of the fabric a clouded appearance.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is the combination and alternation of a narrow fancy-woven stripe with a broad stripe, shaded by broken longitudinal lines, which shade or cloud the general surface of the fabric, as described and shown.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described, and represented in the drawing.
