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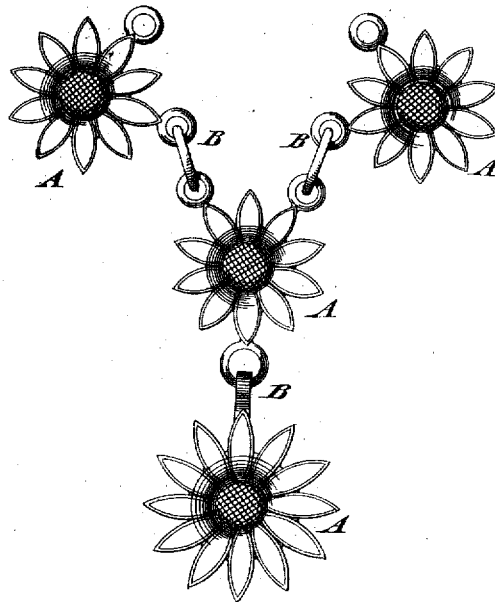

DESIGN FOR A NECKLACE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,955, dated May 1, 1877; application filed April 2, 1877.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{4}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY W. WOODS, of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for a Necklace, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my invention is fully represented in the accompanying illustration, to which reference is made.

The object of this invention is to furnish an improved design for a necklace, bracelet, or similar article of jewelry; and the design consists of a necklace formed of a number of daisy-like flowers of suitable colors, connected by intermediate links.

The necklace or bracelet is formed of a

number of flowers, A, made in the shape of the common daisy, whose leaves are tinted in any suitable colors. The daisies A are connected by plain or other links, B, that pass through eyes of the flowers and string them together, so as to produce a necklace or other article of neat and striking appearance.

I claim as my invention—

The design for a necklace formed of a number of daisy-shaped flowers, connected by alternating links, substantially as shown and described.
