DESIGN FOR A MONUMENT.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,965, dated May 8, 1877; application filed April 27, 1877. [Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JAMES MORGAN, of Brooklyn, county of Kings, and State of New York, have invented a Design for a Monument, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully shown in the accompanying illustration, to which reference is made.

The design consists of a monument for graves, having pyramidally-tapering base, plain middle section or trunk, and enlarged top or capital, with surmounting pyramidal

cap.

In the drawing, A represents the base, which consists of three base stones or steps, ab, of diminishing size and intermediate tapering parts a' and b' between the first and second and second and third step. An inclined step, e, rests on the uppermost step d, and has a concave groove, e', dividing it near the center thereof. The middle section or trunk B rests by a narrow base-step, f, on the base A, tapers slightly toward the upper end, which has an ornamental band, f', the capital C resting thereon. The capital C is enlarged, extending from the trunk B by a groove, g, concave molding g^1 , step g^2 , outwardly inclined step g^2 , to the square head of the capital. The capital C has raised center ridges h at each side, and supports a pyramidally-shaped cap, C, with crowning capital C of smaller size than the main capital, but corresponding in

shape therewith. The crowning capital D' has smaller side ridges than front ridges, and suitable ornaments to the face of the larger ridges.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Pat-

ent-

1. The design for a monument consisting, essentially, of a pyramidally-tapering base, a middle trunk-section, an enlarged capital, with pyramidal surmounting cap, having smaller top capital, substantially as specified and described.

The design for a monument having a base part, consisting of steps a, b, and d, intermediate tapering parts a' b', and inclined and grooved step e e'; next, of a trunk section, B, with narrow base-step and top band; and, finally, of an enlarged capital, with surmounting pyramidal cap, and smaller top capital, substantially as specified and described.

3. The design for a capitol for monuments composed of a base-capital, with center ridges h, a pyramidal cap, D, and a smaller crowning-cap, D', with larger front and back, and smaller side ridges, substantially as described

and shown.
