

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERES.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,011, dated May 29, 1877; application filed May 9, 1877.

[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK S. Bosworth, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawing making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The effect of my novel design will be apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made, said effect being produced by the combination and alternation of shaded stripes with peculiarly woven stripes, all running longitudinally of the fabric, as hereinafter described.

The stripe A is plainly woven, and is shaded by narrow longitudinal stripes a a of the same or varying width, the color of the shading stripes being different from the ground of the fabric.

The stripe A is in alternation with the unshaded stripe B, which is divided into two equal parts, bb, by a narrow longitudinal stripe,

B', of corded weaving, the plainly-woven surface of the parts b b being crossed at regular intervals by the transverse bars, b', which divide the said surfaces into rectangles.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving effect to the design above described, the distinctive character of which is a longitudinal stripe shaded by stripes of a different color than the ground of the fabric, in combination and alternation with a longitudinal stripe whose plain surface is traversed by a fancywoven longitudinal stripe and narrow transverse bars, substantially as described and shown.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as described, and represented in the drawing.
