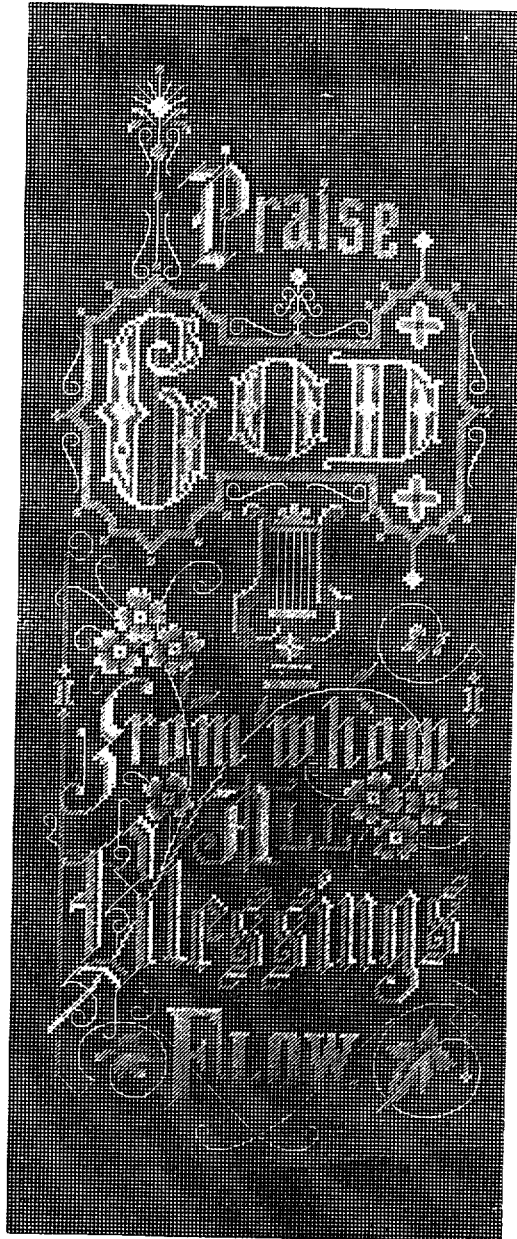

DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,030**, dated June 5, 1877; application filed May 18, 1877.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate upon the surface of the board the stitches to be taken to produce the desired pattern.

The invention consists in the pattern shown in the accompanying illustration, and as hereinafter described, referring specially to a motto.

The motto, which constitutes the principal characteristic of this design, is "Praise God from whom all blessings flow." These words are arranged in transverse lines, as shown, and the surface ornamented by a floriated vine tracery, with an emblem of a musical instrument introduced in the body of the pattern, (here shown as a lyre;) but other or analogous instruments may be introduced.

I claim—

The herein-described design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the motto "Praise God from whom all blessings flow," and floriated tracery, as shown in the accompanying illustration.
