DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,048**, dated June 12, 1877; application filed May 28, 1877.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{4}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ALICE DONLEVY, of New York, in the county of New York and State of New York, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a perspective view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery pattern with special reference to perforated board, having for its object to indicate on the board the pattern to produce the desired result.

It consists in a column resting upon a pedestal and supporting a globe, with an emblem on the pedestal, and a motto twined around the column, as shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

In the pattern a pedestal is represented as

supporting a column, on the top of which rests a globe. On the pedestal is a masonic emblem, a square or level, it not being material to this design which of the two emblems is employed, and around the column is represented a streamer entwined, on which is a motto corresponding to the emblem. It here being a level, the motto is "we meet upon the level." This motto, as the emblem, is not material, it only being essential that there be an emblem and a corresponding motto.

I claim—

The herein-described design for an embroidery pattern, consisting of the pedestal, the column resting thereon, and globe on the column, with a motto entwining the column and emblem on the base, as shown in the accompanying illustration.
