

DESIGN FOR COVERS OF SMOKING-PIPES.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,074, dated June 26, 1877; application filed May 3, 1877.

[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN KIRSCHBAUM, of Waterbury, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented or produced a new and original Design for Metallic Covers for Smoking-Pipes, of which the following is a specification:

In the drawing, Figure 1 is a side elevation of the pipe cover, and Fig. 2 is a plan of the

same.

The cylindrical portion a, which surrounds the upper end of the pipe, is ornamented by being perforated with square or nearly square holes, in two rows, positioned alternately, and above these are slots or elongated holes. The bottom edge of the cylinder is notched, and there is a projecting rim that is knurled or ornamented with diagonal rounding ribs, as at b.

The cover, hinged at c, is made with a base-flange, d, from which rises the perforated portion e, surmounted by a cap, h, that is perfo-

rated by slots, running vertically, or nearly so, as at f, and the extreme upper part of the cover is rounding, and an ornamental flower in bas-relief is represented.

The slots and holes in the cover give to it a highly-ornamental appearance, as well as allowing air to pass into the pipe, and the general configurations of the cover and pipering are artistic and ornamental.

I claim as my production—

1. The design of the pipe ring or cylinder, with the perforations and knurled rib, as represented.

2. The design of the cover with the flanged cap and perforations formed of vertical slots, substantially as represented.
