DESIGN FOR IRON GATES AND RAILS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,155, dated August 14, 1877; application filed February 2, 1877. [Term of Patent 14 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM TWEEDDALE, of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have originated and designed a Pattern for Iron Gates and Rails or Railings, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The said design consists of the vertical center column a, lateral branches i, couplingbar j, supporting ring b, base scroll bars l, arch m, and scroll bars n, arranged essentially as shown—that is to say, the center column and the lateral branches rising from the ring b and the base scrolls k, and joining the bar j and arch m, the branches i also joining the arch by the coils p, the bars l joining the base scroll-bars k, bar j, and the scroll-bars n, and the said scroll-bars n joining the feet of the arch and the base-bar c, and the said parts being ornamented essentially as shownthat is to say, the ring b having the center boss e, the center column having the scroll-

pendants d and the trefoil figures f, the lateral branches and the scroll-bars n having the leaves q, and the arch having the niches r and the oval figures s.

The design also consists of a top rail in connection with the above parts, of which the design is formed by the diagonal bars t, together with the stars u and rosettes v, connecting the upper and lower parallel members of the said top bar.

What I claim as my invention is-

1. A design for iron gates and rails or railings, consisting, essentially, of the center column a, lateral branches i, arch m, and scrollbars j, k, l, and n, arranged and ornamented substantially as set forth.

2. The diagonal bars t, star figures u, and the rosettes v, in connection with the upper and lower parallel members of the top bar o, substantially as set forth.
