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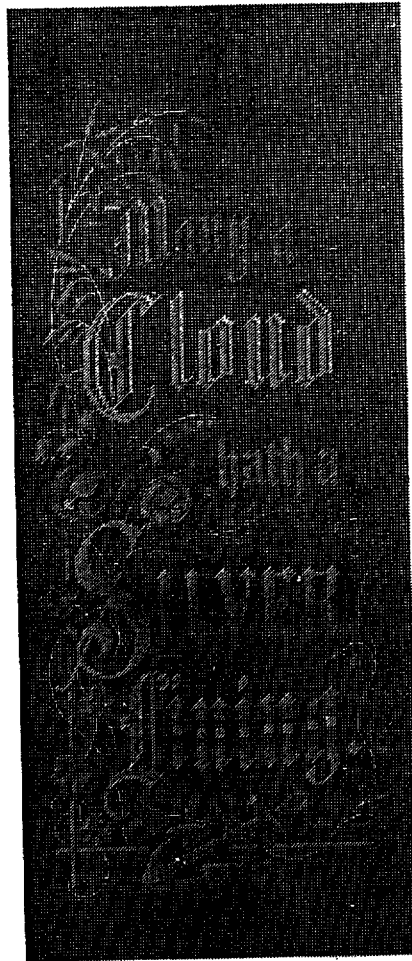

DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,236**, dated September 11, 1877; application filed August 8, 1877.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for pattern for embroidery, with special reference to perforated board; the object being to indicate on the surface the pattern to be wrought; and the invention consists in the motto and ornamentation, as shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

The motto which forms the base of this design is "Many a cloud hath a silver lining." These words are arranged on the surface of the board in substantially the relative position shown in the illustration. Bordering the motto, and interwoven therewith, is a floriated tracery, all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for an embroidery-pattern consisting of the motto "Many a cloud hath a silver lining," and with the ornamentation as herein described, and shown in accompanying illustration.
