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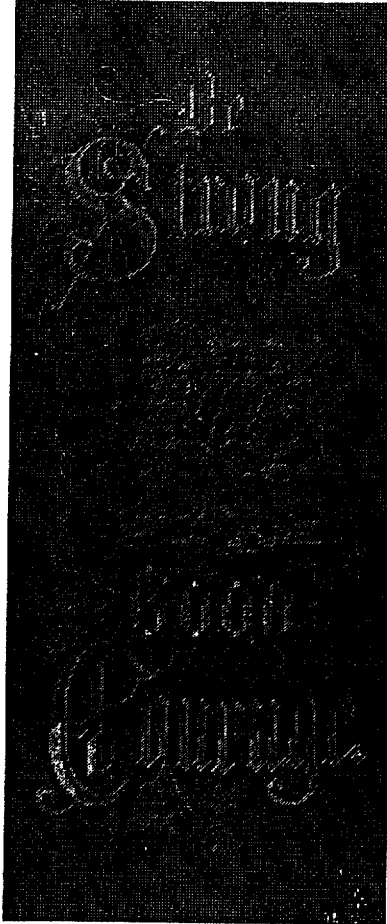

DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,237**, dated September 11, 1877; application filed August 30, 1877.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to an embroidery-pattern with special reference to embroidery on perforated board; the object being to indicate on the surface of the board the stitches to be taken, or part to be covered, to produce the desired pattern; and the invention consists in the pattern shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

The motto which forms the principal feature in this design is "Be strong and of good courage." The words are arranged as shown, and combined with the motto is the representation of an oak-tree. A foliated tracery is interwoven with the words as an ornamentation.

I claim—

The design of an embroidery-pattern consisting of the words "Be strong and of good courage," combined with the representation of an oak-tree, as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
