

EUGENE MULLIGAN AND JEREMIAH H. WOOD, OF BROOKLYN, NEW YORK.

DESIGN FOR A PICTURE-FRAME.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,253, dated September 18,1877; application filed July 25, 1877. [Term of Patent 31 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, EUGENE MULLIGAN and JEREMIAH H. WOOD, both of the city of Brooklyn, State of New York, have originated and designed a Picture-Frame, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of our design is fully represented in the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

The top, bottom, and sides of the frame consist of three bars, a b c, of thin pieces of wood or other stiff material, interwoven at their ends or the corners of the frame.

In the straight parts smaller pieces v, of similar material, are interwoven with these bars a b c, by being bent alternately above and below these bars close to each other and square to said bars.

In the corners pieces or bars n n are interwoven diagonally, crossing each other, and intertwined with the bars a b c forming the sides.

We prefer to make the middle bar b white, and the bars a and c blue, while the short intertwining bars v and n are of red color; but we do not consider the colors selected to be an essential element in our design, the distinctive character of which is found in the intertwining of the shorter bars v at right angles, and of the bars n in the corner diagonal with the three longer bars a b c.

What we claim as our invention is-

The design for a picture-frame, each side consisting of three parallel bars interwoven in the straight part with smaller bars at right angles to the main bars, and having in the corners bars interwoven diagonally to each other, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.
