

DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,255**, dated September 18, 1877; application filed September 11, 1877.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern with special reference to perforated board; the object being to indicate on the surface of the board the pattern to be wrought in the proper relative position to the perforations, so that the stitches necessary to produce the pattern will be indicated on the surface of the board; and the design consists in the motto "Behold what manner of

love the Father hath bestowed upon us," combined with a cross as an emblem, as shown in accompanying illustration, and more fully hereinafter described.

The cross which forms the emblem is centrally arranged, and the words "Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us" are arranged around the emblem, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim-

The design for embroidery-pattern consisting of the motto "Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us," combined with a cross as an emblem, as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
