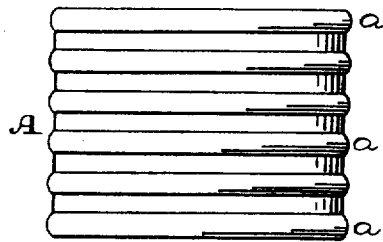

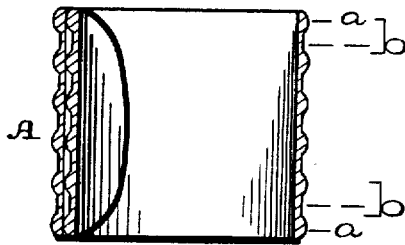

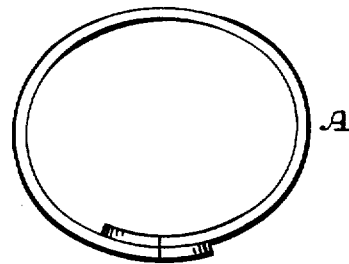
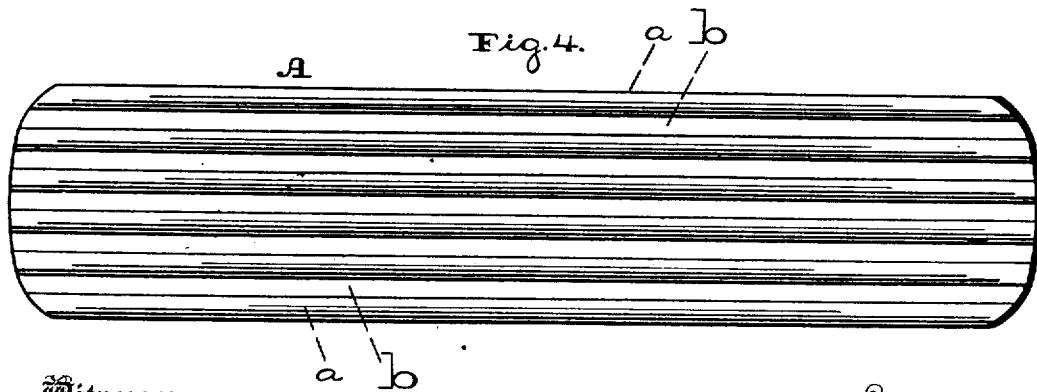

DESIGN FOR A BRACELET.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,265**, dated October 2, 1877; application filed May 28, 1877.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HARVEY LANG, of Kennett's Square, in the county of Chester and State of Pennsylvania, have originated a new and useful Design for Bracelets, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a face view of the bracelet embodying my design. Fig. 2 is a transverse section thereof. Fig. 3 is an edge view thereof. Fig. 4 is a face view of the bracelet spread to show the configuration of the entire length thereof.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts in the several figures.

My invention consists of a design for bracelet, the exposed face of which is partly molded, beaded, or ribbed, so as to present a neat, graceful, and attractive appearance.

Referring to the drawings, A represents a bracelet, whose exposed or outer face is molded or formed with two or more moldings, beads, or ribs, *a*, so that said face is alternately depressed and elevated, as at *a b*.

It will be seen that I present a neat, graceful, and attractive design.

The bracelet may be made of horn, rubber, gold, or other metal and materials.

I claim as my invention—

The design for bracelet having moldings, ribs, or beads *a*, with alternate depressions *b* on its exposed face, substantially as above set forth and shown.
