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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM MORRIS, of London, England, have originated and designed a Pattern for Printed and Woven Goods, called by me the "Anemone Pattern," of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

The plan of this design is an ascending waving line, from which spring, at nearly equal intervals, fancifully-contrived flowers, somewhat resembling anemones. The wave-line is enriched, where visible, by bands of light and dark crossing it obliquely, and by a fringe of trefoiled leaves growing thickly. The center of the flower is formed by similar leaves lying one over the other. The spaces between the flowers are filled by acanthus-like foliage of

bold design, and by subordinate leafage of lanceolate form, which contrasts with the larger leaves, and whose stems oppose the main lines of the design.

I claim—

1. The herein-described design, as illustrated by the accompanying photograph, consisting of the combination of the ornamented wave-line, the anemones, the acanthus-like foliage, and the subordinate leafage of lanceolate form.

2. The combination of the ornamented wave-line and the trefoiled anemones, substantially as shown and described.

3. The combination of the acanthus-like foliage and the subordinate leafage of lanceolate form, substantially as shown and described.
