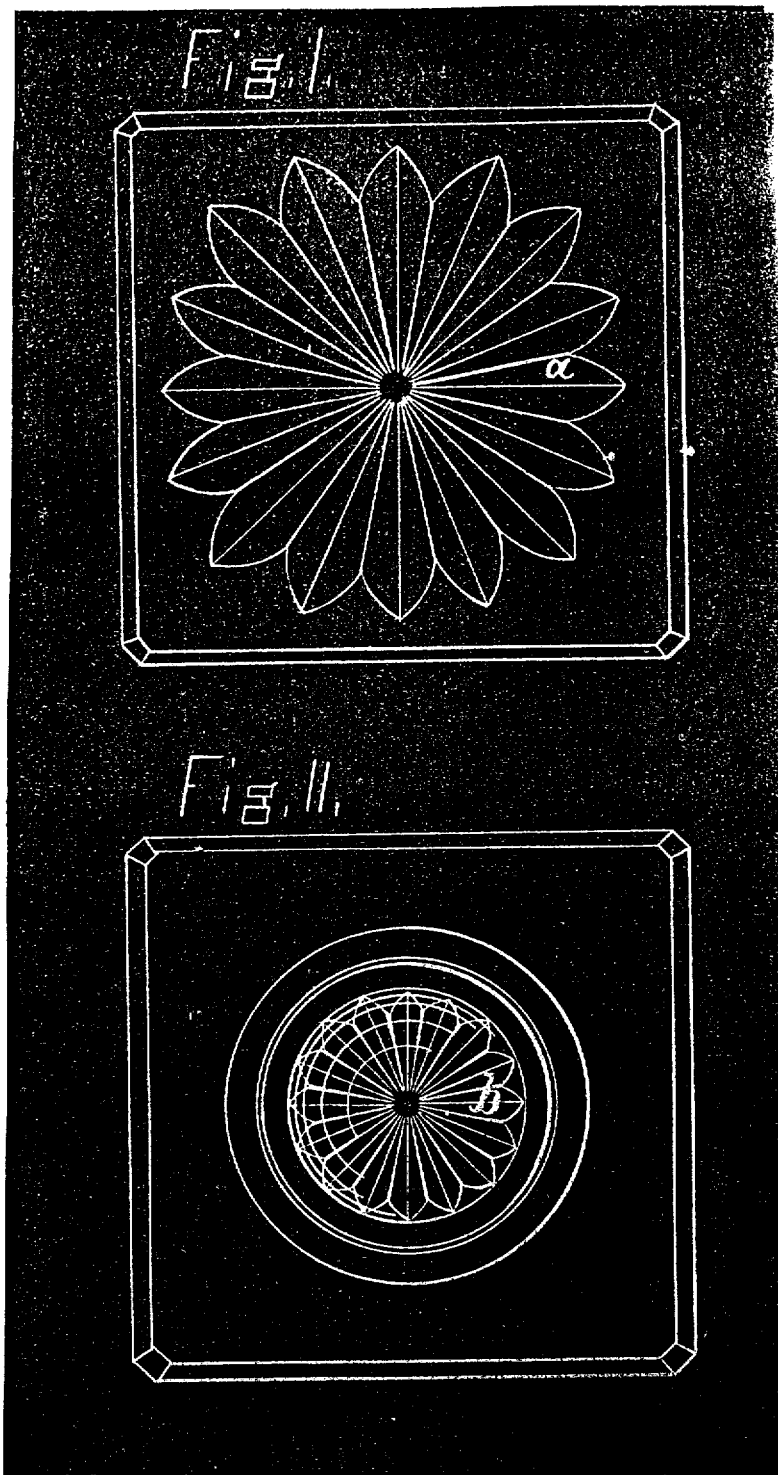

DESIGN FOR INKSTAND.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,338**, dated December 11, 1877; application filed November 6, 1877.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN BAPTISTE DOBELMANN, of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have originated and designed a Design for an Inkstand, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying illustration, making part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a plan view of the bottom of a glass inkstand which embodies my invention, and Fig. 2 is a top view of the same inkstand.

a in Fig. 1 represents a star sunk into the bottom of a glass inkstand, the said star being composed of radial elevations and depressions. *b* in Fig. 2 designates the ink-well, placed directly over the center of the star *a*, and having a semi-spherical bottom. The ra-

dial lines in said Fig. 2 represent the star as it appears when viewed through the top of the round-bottomed ink-well. A flat-bottomed or other-shaped well may, however, be employed, if desired. The general contour and configuration of the inkstand may also be in any pleasing design, the essential feature of my design being the star on the bottom of the inkstand, placed directly under the well.

I claim as my invention—

In a design for a glass inkstand, the design for the bottom, having the star *a* thereon directly under the ink-well, substantially as described.
