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

## DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERES.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,346, dated December 11, 1877; application filed November 16, 1877. [Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK S. Bosworтн, of the city and county of Providence and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawing making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The effect produced by the novel design hereinafter described will be apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made; said effect being produced by the combination of fancy woven and shaded stripes, as hereinafter described.

A is a broad longitudinal stripe of plain weaving, whose whole surface is more or less shaded by a color differing from that of the ground of the fabric. These stripes A are in alternation transversely of the fabric, with broad longitudinal stripes B, upon the central portion of whose plainly-woven surfaces are superimposed oppositely-inclined lines  $b \, b'$  and c c', so arranged that their tops, respectively, unite, forming inverted V's, (herring-bone

fashion,) the bars or arms  $b\ b'$ , forming one set of inverted V's, being longer than the arms ce', forming the other set, and these two sets or series being arranged in alternation longitudinally on and forming a part of the said stripe B.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is broad longitudinal stripes A, whose surfaces are shaded by a different color than the ground of the fabric, in combination and alternation with broad longitudinal stripes B, upon the central portion of whose surfaces are placed, in longitudinal alternation, series of inverted  $\mathbf{V}$ 's, b b'and e e', the bars forming which are raised above the ground of the fabric.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described, and represented in the drawing.
