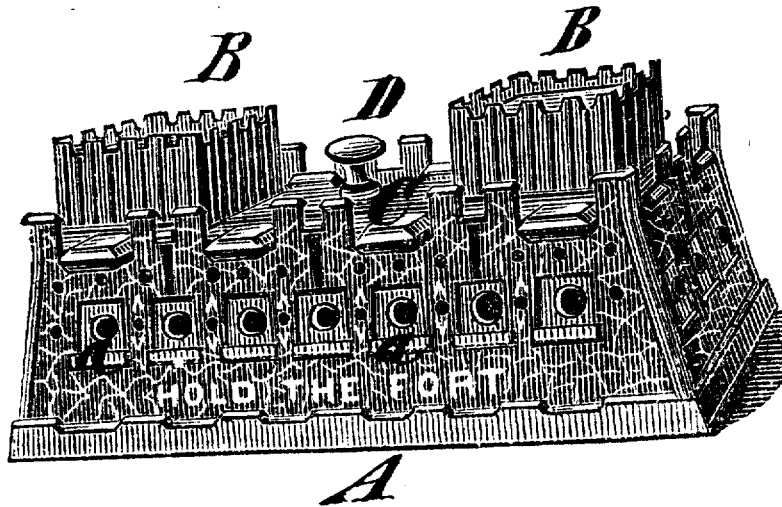

## DESIGN FOR INKSTANDS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,413**, dated January 29, 1878; application filed November 30, 1877.  
[Term of patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, SAMUEL CLARK, of the city of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a certain novel Design for an Inkstand, of which the following is a specification:

My invention consists in a design for an inkstand comprising a rectangular base or body, having in its walls representations of port-holes or loop-holes, and provided above its top with castellated turrets.

The accompanying drawing represents a perspective view of an inkstand embodying my design.

A designates the body or base of this inkstand, which is made to resemble a fort or fortified castle. It is here shown as inclining inwardly from the bottom to the top, and is provided with openings or port-holes *a*, and is castellated around the top. The covers B of

the ink-wells are shown as made in the form of turrets, which are also castellated around the top to enhance their appearance. It will be seen that in this example of my invention there are two of these turrets.

Between these ink-well covers B, I have arranged a receptacle, C, whose cover has a handle, D, representing a chimney-cap.

What I claim as my novel design, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

An inkstand comprising a rectangular base or body, having in its walls representations of port-holes or loop-holes, and provided above its top with castellated turrets B B and cover D, substantially as herein shown and described.
