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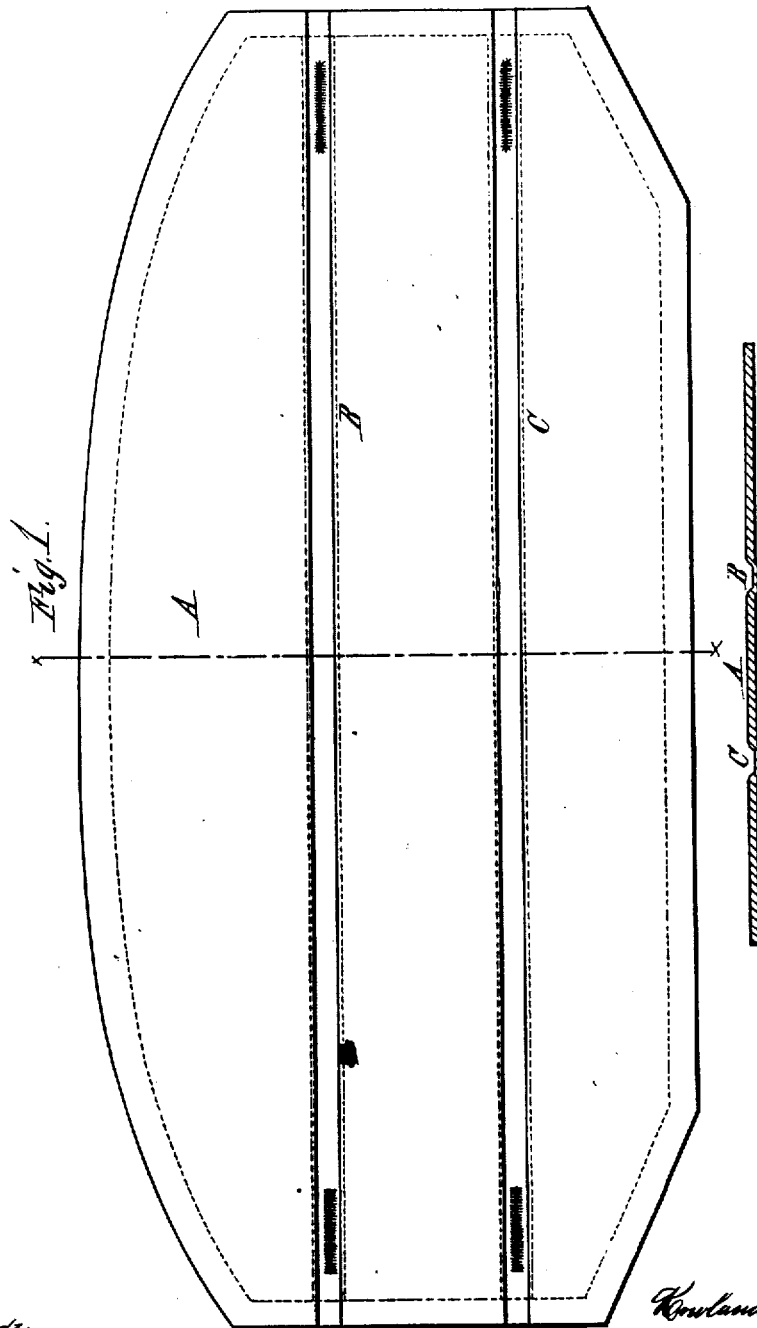

DESIGN FOR A CUFF.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,535**, dated March 12, 1878; application filed January 14, 1878.
[Term of patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ROWLAND S. NORTON, of the city of Troy, county of Rensselaer, and State of New York, have invented and produced a new and original Design for Cuffs for Ladies' and Gentlemen's Wear, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to letters of reference marked thereon, making a part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in my accompanying drawings; and consists in making the cuff with two Brighton or thin narrow centers lengthwise of the cuff.

A represents the cuff. B and C represent the Brighton or thin centers. These thin centers are usually produced by making the back of the cuff of three pieces cut lengthwise of the cuff, the middle piece being cut so narrow that it will not fill the space between the two outer pieces, thereby leaving a thin center, called in the trade "a Brighton center," upon each side of this middle piece. These

centers are usually of one or two thicknesses of material, while the remaining parts of the cuff are of three or more. The edges or folds of material at the sides of these centers are stitched through with one or more rows of stitching, which form on the inner side of the cuff four beaded edges, and upon the other or face side of the cuff, and along the sides of these two centers, rows of stitching. In the ends of these centers the button-holes are made.

What I claim as my invention is—

The herein-described design for cuffs, consisting of the plain face A having the two parallel longitudinal depressions B and C, substantially as shown in the accompanying drawing.
