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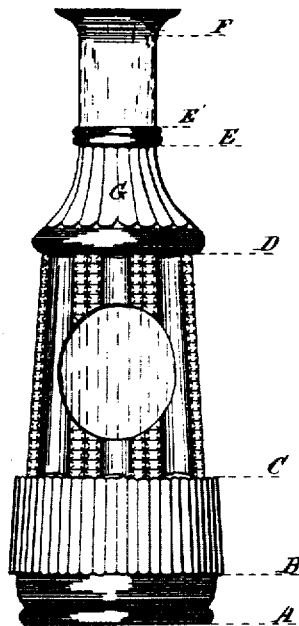

GUSTAVUS STORM, OF PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA.

DESIGN FOR PERFUMERY-BOTTLES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,607**, dated March 26, 1878; application filed March 12, 1878.
[Term of patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GUSTAVUS STORM, of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a new form for Perfumery-Bottle, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification.

My design for a perfumery-bottle is made of a tapering contour, round or circular in cross-section, and with a straight neck curved outwardly at the mouth. The sides of the bottle are embellished, as more fully hereinafter described.

The base of the bottle from A to B is surrounded by a small round molding, A, and a larger molding, B, of the ovolo or quarter-round order. From B to C the bottle is encircled by a molding resembling a ruffle or frill; and from C to D are vertical stripes, ornamented with figures of a honey-comb form, with plain furrows between them.

At D the bottle is swelled slightly outward,

and then curves gradually inward to the junction of the neck, as shown at E, at which point two convex bands are formed. From E' to F the neck is made straight and plain, with the upper part or mouth of the bottle curved or spread outward. The curved portion of the bottle below the neck is fluted, as shown at G.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for a perfumery-bottle, of a cylindrical tapering form, ornamented at the base with moldings A B, and from B to C with a molding resembling a ruffle or frill, and from C to D with figured stripes, swelled slightly outward, as shown at D, and curved inward and fluted, as shown at G, with two convex bands, E, formed at the junction of the neck, which is made straight from E' to F, and curved or spread outward at the mouth, substantially as shown and described.
