

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,694, dated May 28, 1878; application filed May 13, 1878.

[Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK SNOW Bos-WORTH, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the accompanying drawing, making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The novel design, hereinafter described, consists in the combination and alternation of broad plainly-woven and shaded stripes with narrower figured stripes, the effect produced by said combination being apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing to which reference is made.

The broad plainly-woven stripes A traverse the fabric longitudinally, and have the greater portion of their surfaces from one side toward and beyond the center shaded by narrow stripes, a a^1 a^2 , of unequal widths, and of a color differing from the ground of the stripe. These shading-stripes are placed equal distances apart, the space of separation being of the color of the ground of the fabric, and they are arranged in groups upon the surface of the stripe A in such a manner that the group composed of the widest shading-stripes a a a appears at one side of the stripe A, while arranged next in order is a group composed of narrower stripes, a^1 a^1 a^1 , then a group of still narrower stripes, a^2 a^2 a^2 , the stripes composing the said groups shading the greater portion of the surface of the said stripe A.

In alternation with the broad stripes A are narrower figured stripes B, upon each side of whose plainly-woven grounds are arranged a line of narrow transverse bars, b. In longitudinal alternation with the said bars are figures b, composed of a central bar and two downwardly-inclined side bars, the said figures, as so composed, extending the width of the stripe B, and both the bars b and figures b appearing slightly raised above the general surface of the fabric.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving a desirable effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is broad plainly-woven longitudinal stripes A, the greater portion of whose surfaces from one side toward and beyond the center are shaded by stripes of varying widths, and of a color different from the ground, in combination and alternation with narrower stripes B, whose surfaces are figured by two lines of transverse bars in longitudinal alternation with figures composed of a central and inclined side bars, all the said bars appearing raised above the surface of the fabric.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described, and represented in the drawing.
