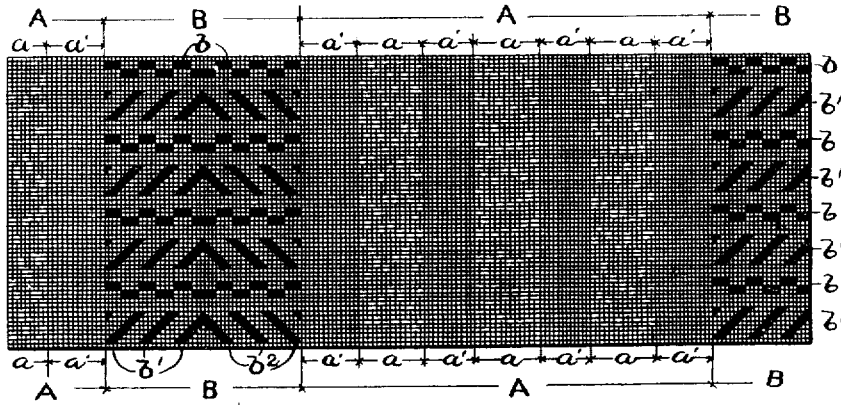

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,696**, dated May 28, 1878; application filed May 13, 1878.
[Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK S. BOSWORTH, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the accompanying drawing, making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The novel design hereinafter described consists in the combination and alternation of broad plainly-woven and shaded stripes with narrower figured stripes, the effect produced by said combination being apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

The broad stripe A traverses the fabric longitudinally, and a part of its plainly-woven surface is shaded in stripes *a a a* by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of the fabric, the said ground appearing in the intermediate and outer parts *a' a' a' a'* unshaded.

In alternation with the broad stripe A is the narrower stripe B, upon whose plainly-woven ground are superimposed a double line of bars, *b*, separated from each other transversely by about their length, the bars in one line being arranged opposite the space between the bars

of the other. These double lines of bars are arranged at regular intervals on the stripe B, and are in alternation longitudinally of said stripe with diagonal bars *b¹ b²* placed upon the intervening spaces, the direction of inclination of the bars *b¹* being opposite to that of *b²*, the said bars being separated from each other, and those at the center meeting in the form of an inverted V.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving a desirable effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is broad plainly-woven longitudinal stripes A, parts of whose surfaces are shaded in stripes by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of the stripe, in combination and alternation with narrower stripes B, upon whose plainly-woven grounds are superimposed double lines of transverse bars in alternation with diagonal bars having opposite inclinations.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described, and represented in the drawing.
