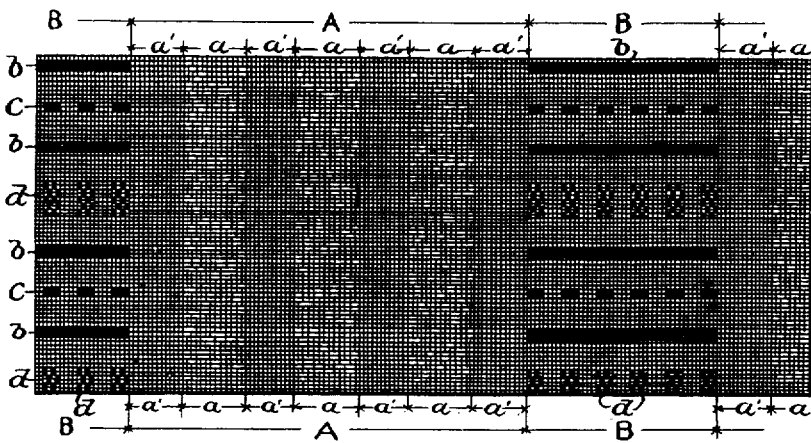

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,697**, dated May 28, 1878; application filed May 13, 1878.
[Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK S. BOSWORTH, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the accompanying drawing, making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The novel design hereinafter described consists in the combination and alternation of broad plainly-woven and shaded stripes with narrower figured stripes, the effect produced by said combination being apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

The fabric is traversed longitudinally by broad plainly-woven stripes A, parts of whose surfaces are shaded in stripes *a a* by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of the stripe, the said ground appearing unshaded in the intermediate and outer parts *a' a' a' a'*. These stripes A are in alternation with narrower longitudinal stripes B, upon whose plainly-woven grounds are superimposed long bars *b*, extending the full width of the said stripe, lines *c* of short transverse bars, and rectangular blocks *d* of basket-weaving. The short bars, forming the lines *c*, are separated from each other transversely,

as are likewise the rectangular blocks of basket-weaving *d*, so that spaces of plain weaving appear between the bars and blocks on all sides. The long bars *b*, lines *c* of short transverse bars *c*, and blocks *d* appear in alternation longitudinally of the stripe in the following order: a long bar, *b*, line *c* of short bars, bar *b*, blocks *d*, bar *b*, line *c*, &c., forming a figured stripe of peculiar character.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving a desirable effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is broad plainly-woven longitudinal stripes A, shaded in stripes by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of said stripe, in combination and alternation with narrower figured stripes B, upon whose plainly-woven grounds are superimposed long transverse bars, lines of short transverse bars, and rectangular blocks of basket-weaving, all in alternation longitudinally of the said stripe.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described, and represented in the drawing.
