

## DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,698, dated May 28, 1878; application filed May 13, 1878. [Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK S. Bosworth, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the accompanying drawing, making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The novel design hereinafter described consists in the combination and alternation of broad plainly-woven and shaded stripes with narrower figured stripes, the effect produced by said combination being apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

The broad stripe A traverses the fabric longitudinally, and a part of its plainly-woven surface is shaded in stripes *a a a* by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of said stripe, the said ground appearing in the intermediate and outer parts *a' a' a' a'* unshaded.

In alternation with the stripe A is the narrower stripe B, upon whose plainly-woven ground is superimposed a central longitudinal line, b, of fancy weaving. On each side of the line b are arranged longitudinal rows  $b^1 b^1 b^2 b^2 b^2 b^2$  of diagonal bars, the said rows being sep-

arated from each other and from the line b, the bars composing the said rows being also separated. The diagonal bars on rows  $b^1$  are inclined in one direction, while those in rows  $b^2$  have an opposite inclination, the said bars appearing raised above the surface of the fabric, and giving to the stripe B a peculiar appearance.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving a desirable effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is broad plainly-woven longitudinal stripes A, parts of whose surfaces are shaded in stripes by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of the stripe, in combination and alternation with narrower figured stripes B, upon the plainly-woven ground of each of which is placed a central longitudinal line of basket-weaving, together with longitudinal rows of oppositely-inclined bars, which appear raised above the ground of the stripe.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described and represented in the drawing.
