

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,699, dated May 28, 1878; application filed May 13, 1878. [Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK S. Bosworth, of the city and county of Providence, and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the accompanying drawing, making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The novel design hereinafter described consists in the combination and alternation of broad plainly-woven and shaded stripes with narrower figured stripes, the effect produced by said combination being apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

The fabric is traversed longitudinally by the broad stripes A, the greater portion of whose plainly-woven surfaces are centrally shaded by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of the stripe. Each stripe A is in alternation with a narrower longitudinal stripe, B, upon whose plainly-woven ground are superimposed a series of figures, each of which is composed of two oppositely-inclined diagonal bars, b, meeting at

their tops, the lower end of each diagonal bar being joined by a transverse bar, b', which extends to the edge of the stripe, the figures thus composed being arranged at regular intervals upon the said stripe and appearing raised above its surface.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combination of colors for giving a desirable effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is broad plainly-woven stripes A, the greater portion of whose surfaces are centrally shaded by broken longitudinal lines of a color differing from that of the ground of the stripe, in combination and alternation with other longitudinal stripes B, upon whose plainly-woven grounds are superimposed figures composed of transverse and diagonal bars in connection.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as herein described and represented in the drawing.
